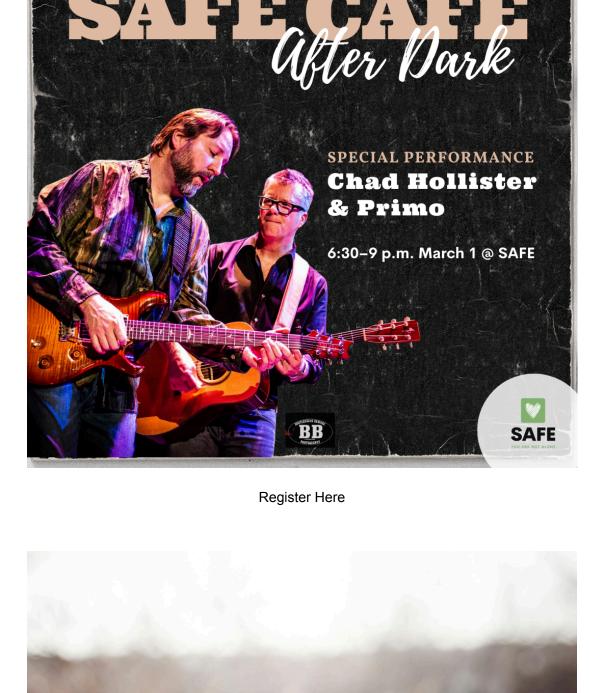

Opioid abatement funds are intended to address gaps in care and increase access to treatment and services for Opioid Use Disorder, prevention, and harm reduction.

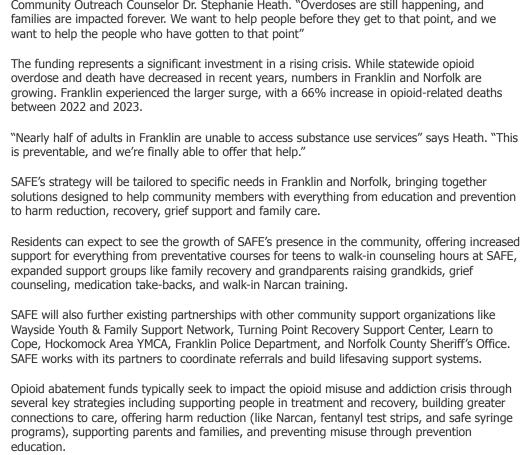

His recovery journey took a turn after being diagnosed with a rare and life-threatening brain disease in 2017. In that time, Jake also developed "locked-in syndrome", a condition causing complete body paralysis. "It was the worst you can imagine. It was like being a prisoner in solitary confinement," says Jake.

life with a positive mindset, crediting his recovery with a shift in thinking. More recently, Jake has become a voice for recovery, sharing his story on his YouTube channel and popular podcast, Blink, which details his survival with a deadly illness and overcoming addiction. His podcast remains at #2 on the Apple Podcasts Top Series chart today. He has also developed a smartphone application Ahoi, which directs users to locations that meet specific accessibility

needs.

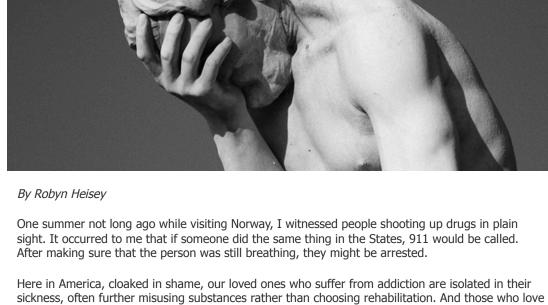

A BRIEF STUDY OF SHAME



them suffer in their own isolation, cloaked in that very same shame.

One person in my Families Anonymous group shared that their best friend didn't know the real story of why their son was in jail. Shame kept them from sharing the details. Not only were they afraid that they wouldn't get the support they desperately needed, they also feared that their friend might shun them – and blame them for their son's struggles.

Shame runs fathoms deep. While those suffering from addiction can (and do) often die after one too many overdoses, those who love them are often dying from the inside out. A significant number of those in my FA group endure serious medical conditions, no doubt aggravated or brought on by high cortisol levels caused by stress. They suffer stress from the

shame of having tried too long—in silence, alone—to do as all big-hearted co-dependents do: to

save their loved one's life while neglecting their very own. When my son hit rock bottom, I struggled with self-care, drinking at night to numb the feelings of terror, helplessness, and shame. Pouring a drink along with a block of cheese or a license platesized bar of chocolate I'd think, "You deserve this nightly party of one with all you're going through and endured."

I see now the shame I felt and the way I numbed it. I found myself a recovery program, quit drinking, and realized it was up to me and only me (just like it was up to my son and only my son) to begin shedding my shame and making myself better. And I secured a sponsor in my FA program

and stopped going at it alone. And all of me, body, spirit, and mind started to heal.

Working the 12 steps, I faced shame head-on, like the shame of wondering whether if I'd been a better mother, my son would've been saved from so much pain; shame for the out-of-district schools he attended; shame for his behaviors. Prior to learning and living the 12 steps, I was my son, and he, in my eyes, was me. We were without separation, the boundaries between us blurred

like the blood and food we shared while he was in utero. The choices he made seemed like my very

Today, I've chosen to shed my shame. I've replaced it with love, for myself and the many years I spent seeking the best care for my son. My love for my son no longer enables him but supports him

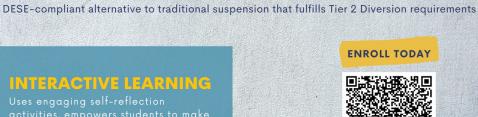
in his ongoing recovery, setbacks and all. And my love colors every day that I wake up.

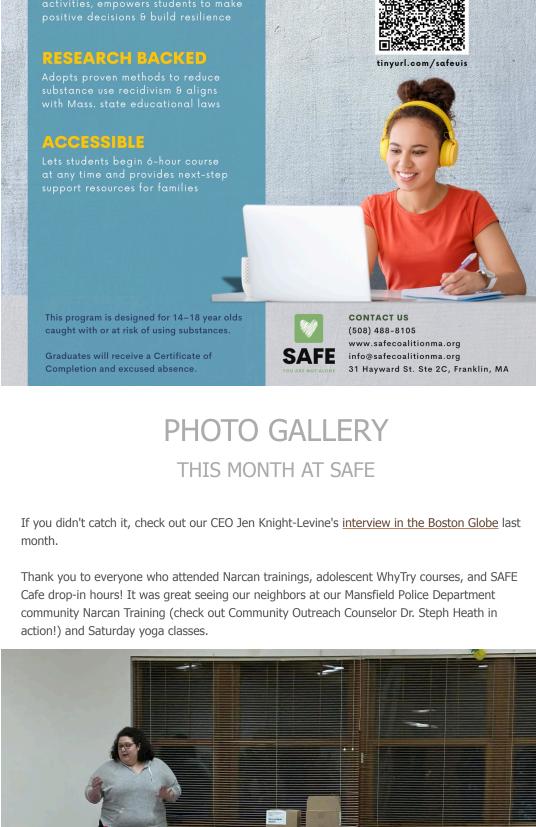
